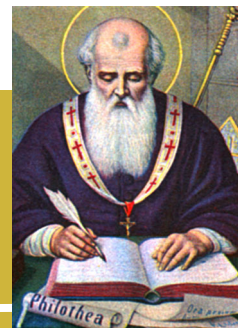

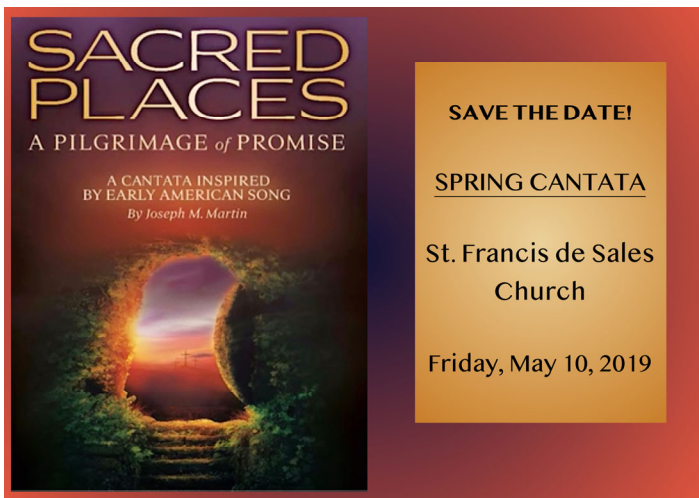
SIDE BY SIDE DINNER

FAITH WITH A FACE - JEANNE MCCARRON

For the past 25 years, Jeanne McCarron has quietly and steadily made a difference at St. Francis de Sales parish in numerous capacities. Initially recruited by Fr. Dave Braun, Jeanne started her volunteer career as a lector and served on the Prayer and Worship committee. She is also a Eucharistic Minister and helps to run our parish's early morning communion services. She started up a program to bring communion to nursing homes and the homebound. She is currently our parish sacristan and also heads up the Bereavement Ministry.

Jeanne and her husband, Bill, have 7 children, 9 grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren. She spent her 45-year career as a nurse (including 27 years as surgical nurse and 6 years as a hospice nurse). As a little girl, Jeanne would accompany her mother to their church, as her mother was also the sacristan for their parish. The role of the sacristan is a "behind-the-scenes" one to help keep things organized for Masses. Here at St. Francis de Sales, Jeanne refurbishes the hosts and wine, maintains the sanctuary candle, launders the linens, towels, and purificators, straightens out the cassocks, makes sure that the priests' microphones have fresh batteries, and generally keeps things in order in the sacristy. What's the best thing about that? "It's a holy place. So very calm and peaceful", says Jeanne.

Jeanne was instrumental in starting N.O.A.H. at St. Francis de Sales. Named after her son, Noah, the acronym stands for No One Alone at Home. Now run by parishioner Lucy Leahy, the group has developed a schedule with volunteers to bring communion to people who are homebound. Along with Sylvia Navin, Jeanne also works with other local parishes to cover Lakeland Nursing Home so that residents can receive communion on a regular basis. In addition, she started another project, S.A.M. (Start A Movement) to care for the homeless which was named in honor of her other son, Sam.

One of Jeanne's most meaningful endeavors is the Bereavement Ministry. In 2001, Sr. Evelyn asked her to take over this important endeavor when she retired. Jeanne says, "The Holy Spirit guided me from there!" Jeanne has a system to bring comfort and support to those in our parish who have lost a loved one. Judie notifies Jeanne when a death takes place and Jeanne initially sends a sympathy card from the parish. Three days after that, she sends a letter, and one week later she makes a phone call. She initiates prayers for the grieving at daily Mass and at the Divine Mercy Chaplet on Wednesdays. She sends letters throughout the year and calls on the 1-year anniversary. She usually manages 25-35 of these letters a month and is there to listen if people want to reach out. "I am blessed by being touched by so many people sharing their stories as they go through one of the most difficult times in their lives. Even though there is sadness, there is joy and laughter amongst the memories. Many say that they wouldn't get through it without their faith," says Jeanne. The people who have been the recipients of these caring communications give very positive feedback. "They feel comforted, supported and cared for, and very much appreciate the prayers, letters and phone calls."

Thank you, Jeanne, for your dedication and your compassionate spirit. Your efforts have made trying times easier for countless people. We are very blessed to have your time and talent here at St. Francis de Sales!

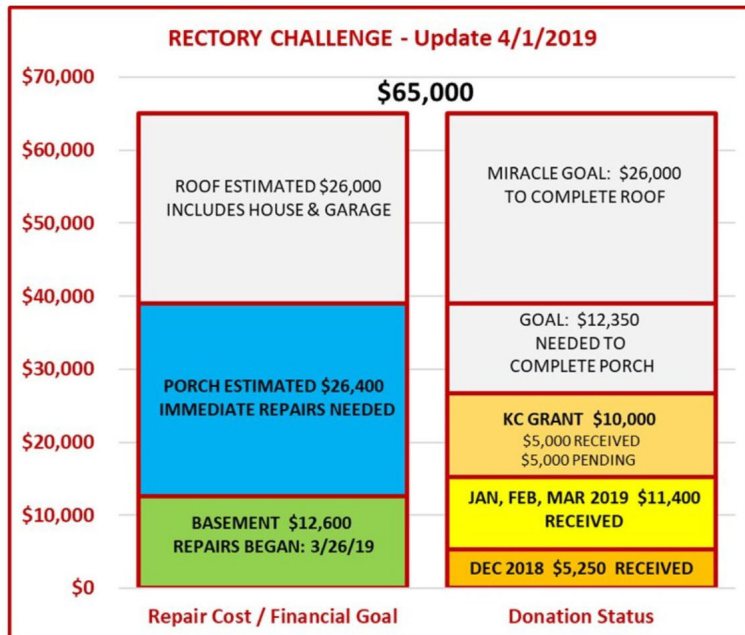

Preparing for 'Our Next 100 Years'

RECTORY: Repairs / Funding / Short-Long Term Plan



History of the Rectory: The rectory was built in 1901 and has housed at least one or more priests on site since that time. The rectory has been used as the primary residence as well as office and meeting space for resident priests over the years. The building is comprised of 4 bedrooms, 2 offices, a den, living room, dining room, kitchen, laundry room, 4 bathrooms, a front and back stairwell typical of homes of that time period, and a wrap around porch. Other features are a full stone 4 room basement, full stand up unfinished attic, and a two-1/2 car garage with a full upper level.

Current Status and Condition of Rectory:

- The rectory building is sound per the structural engineer hired to review and analyze the needs of the building. A report comprised of 'marked ups' of suggested improvements was generated. Builder / parish member, Chris Weber agreed with the approach, and has provided an estimate for prescribed work.
- Work consists of repair of building structure damaged by a previously poor installation of HVAC. In years past a weight bearing basement support wall was weakened and the center of the rectory developed a slight dip of 3/4-inch. Our structural engineer believes this is correctable. Work has begun to remedy.
- Porch foundation footings are needed (and addressed under the Weber quote). Porch columns, steps, decking, and railings show decay; repairs are required and addressed in quotes received. Numerous, but minor, safety, security, and sanitary tasks have been remedied and completed by volunteers.

Funding Sources:

Our present source of funding combines the following; private donations, fundraising, a planned 2nd collection at Mass, and planned parish budgeting. One successful example of such funding is the **Knights of Columbus \$10,000 Matching Grant which has raised \$15,000** thru matched funds, and another \$5,000 committed funds pending from KC's. This spring we have: scheduled work days; a "Rectory Lawn Party"; and beyond that, we are open to suggestion.

Preparing for 'Our Next 100 Years' - Long Term Vision for Rectory:

- **Primary Use:** That the Parish will continue to reap the benefit of having a resident pastor, associate pastor, seminarian or a deacon (and family) on site, contributing to an integral relationship with the parish. A rectory offers a housing benefit that may present considerable value to some religious staff as a form of compensation. A well-maintained rectory also offers options for housing visiting and substitute priests. The assumption is that a Pastor or Associate Pastor will remain in the rectory. While it is difficult to project future residence, the rectory acts as an incentive in attracting new religious staff members to the parish.
- **Alternative Use:** In the event that religious staff elect not to take residence in the rectory, this building (estimated asset value exceeding \$750,000) offers opportunity as additional office / meeting space. It can also be used as rental property, daycare, housing for a parish director, retired priests, etc. as has been the case with other parishes in the area over the years. Because Lake Geneva is a popular vacation destination, the rectory may also be attractive for retreat groups or vacationing religious members.

Conclusions and Recommendation: A long-term vision for the Rectory is difficult to propose. However, as outlined above, the Rectory is a valuable and flexible asset in terms of use. In conclusion, it is prudent to maintain the value of this asset through regular periodic maintenance and wise but cautious spending decisions as has been and continues to be accomplished by our Rectory Committee volunteers.

The full cost to bring the rectory up to date is \$65,000. That includes: basement structural repairs; repairing/ restoring front porch; and roof replacement as out lined on attached graph. We presently have \$26,650 committed in donations, and hope to raise a minimum of an additional \$12,500 for porch repairs. Our miracle goal of \$38,350 would complete all required repairs. DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY ~ APRIL 28, 2019

The importance of Divine Mercy Sunday...

The official Vatican explanation of the Feast of Mercy: According to Jesus, the Feast of Mercy is to be celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Jesus is showing to us the close connection between the Easter mystery of man's redemption and this feast. The Feast of Mercy is to be not only a day designated for the worship of God's mercy, **but also a day of grace for all people, particularly for sinners. Jesus attached great promises to this feast. One is the promise of complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. In other words, this grace is equal to the one we receive in the sacrament of baptism. It offers a completely new beginning!** The image is to be blessed and venerated on Divine Mercy Sunday.

Jesus told St. Maria Faustina that **"all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened"** on this special day. (Diary #699). **"I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My Mercy."** (Diary #1109) On this feast of Divine Mercy, Jesus is offering us an opportunity to receive a **plenary indulgence**, for forgiveness of sins and **all punishment due to sin!** Through the message of Divine Mercy, our Lord is preparing us for His final coming and an opportunity for complete remission of temporal punishment due to sin! In one of a series of revelations in the 1930's, our Lord told St. Faustina: **"Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My Mercy"**. (#300). St. Maria Faustina (1905-38) was designated by our Lord Himself as the "Secretary" and "Apostle" of His Mercy. Our Lord told her: **"You will prepare the world for My final coming"** (#429).

What are the requirements to receive a Divine Mercy Plenary Indulgence?

Contemplating with great devotion the mercy of God, **receive the sacrament of Confession (within 20 days before or after), holy communion on that day and recite an Our Father and the Creed for the intentions or our Holy Father, Pope Francis. In any church or chapel, have a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for sin (including venial sins) and take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of His Divine Mercy, or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!).**

The Chaplet of Mercy as a Novena

According to St. Faustina, Our Lord promised extraordinary graces to those who would recite the Chaplet of Divine Mercy! **Although the prayer may be recited any time, Our Lord specifically requested that it be recited as a novena, especially on the 9 days before the Feast of Mercy.** He promised: "By this Novena (of Chaplets) I will grant every possible grace to souls" (#796).

Our Lord said to St. Faustina: "Encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you... **Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death... When they say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just Judge, but as the Merciful Savior.** ...Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My Mercy. ...Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will". (#687, #1541, #1731).

Divine Mercy Novena and Chaplet brochures are located at the entrances of the Church.

WHAT'S SO "GOOD" ABOUT GOOD FRIDAY?

Ask any of the 51 people who attended Fr. Rich Rosinski's presentation on the Triduum last Saturday, April 6th at St. Francis de Sales and they will tell you. But just in case you don't know someone who was there I'll try to fill you in. The Gospel of John Chapter 18:1-19:42 is the Gospel that is read every Good Friday "The Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to John". In it, as Fr. Rich explained, Jesus was in control of the whole situation from His answer in the Garden to the soldiers, "I AM" to Pilate's seating Jesus, after He was scourged and crowned with thorns, on the judge's bench, which is reserved ONLY for the Governor; to Jesus' timing of His death on the Cross – after He had made sure that His Mother, Mary would be taken care of by John (widows with no family, in those days, had no social status or means of support); He then fulfilled the rest of the Scripture in saying "I thirst" and when He had taken the wine He was offered, He said, "It is finished" and then, bowing His head, He handed over the spirit and died. The Romans and Jews didn't kill Him, He chose to die for us and our sins.

Fr. Rich walked us through all 3 days from Holy Thursday evening with the foot washing and being dismissed in silence to Good Friday, entering again, in silence, venerating the cross, which is a custom that goes back to the 4th century; receiving the Eucharist, which was consecrated on Holy Thursday, as Good Friday is the only day in the year that Mass is NOT allowed to be celebrated; being dismissed again in silence; returning for the Easter Vigil, in silence and darkness, until the Paschal Candle is lit and the light shared with all but the Candidates for Reception and the entire Church is once again in light and the singing of the Exultet begins. Thus we have the 3 day Mass of the Triduum, the 3 holiest days of the year, leading up to the Glorious celebration of the Resurrection on Easter.

For those who were able to attend, thank you for your support of Father's presentation and I pray that this Triduum will have new and deeper meaning for you as we prepare to celebrate Jesus' glorious Resurrection at Easter.
